

A Citizen's Guide to Michigan Campaign Finance 2010

WARNING

Undisclosed political spending is a threat to democracy and the public interest.

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STATE OVERVIEW

The 2010 state political campaigns were not the most expensive in Michigan history. However, they did set a record as the least accountable campaigns ever for the major statewide offices. Of \$61 million spent in the races for governor, secretary of state, attorney general and justice of the Supreme Court, \$22.9 million was not disclosed in the State's campaign finance reporting system. That amount paid for candidate-focused television issue advertisements that the Michigan Department of State does not consider to be campaign expenditures. Records of that spending were collected by the Michigan Campaign Finance Network from the public files of the state's television broadcasters and cable systems.

Among the bellwether occurrences in the 2010 election cycle:

- Three winners of statewide election won television dominated campaigns without buying a broadcast television advertisement of their own. They were now Secretary of State Ruth Johnson, now Supreme Court Justice Mary Beth Kelly and Democratic gubernatorial nominee Virg Bernero. Their political parties provided the television budgets, mostly outside the campaign finance reporting system.
- Over half of all spending in the general elections for secretary of state, attorney general and justice of the Supreme Court was undisclosed. The undisclosed spending paid for candidate-focused television issue advertisements.
- The largest political action committee in the history of Michigan politics, the Republican Governors Association Michigan 2010 PAC, raised and spent \$8.4 million. The RGA MI 2010 PAC was one of at least 15 state

PACs that were organized to redistribute \$114 million raised in 2010 by the Republican Governors Association, a 527 committee. While Michigan donors gave \$8.6 million to the RGA 527, including \$5.4 million from the Michigan Chamber of Commerce, 98 percent of contributions to the RGA MI 2010 PAC were attributed to persons who do not reside in Michigan. The RGA MI 2010 PAC gave \$5.3 million to the Michigan Republican Party and \$3 million to Rick Perry for Governor of Texas. The RGA 527 organization paid \$3.6 million for unreported candidate-focused issue ads attacking Democrat Virg Bernero and supporting now Governor Rick Snyder. The PACs lifecycle from organization to dissolution was only 13 months.

- Corporate PACs made their debut in Michigan following the U.S. Supreme Court decision in *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission* and the related overturning of *Austin v. Michigan Chamber of Commerce*. One corporate PAC, Business Leaders for Michigan II, disclosed all its corporate donors as it made independent expenditures totaling \$85,000 in support of two Republican Michigan Senate candidates, David Hildenbrand and Tonya Schuitmaker. The Michigan Realtors Association corporate PAC concealed its local donors by claiming its contributions came from an internal corporate shell, while making independent expenditures totaling \$450,000 in support of Republican Supreme Court nominees, Robert Young and Mary Beth Kelly.

While unreported spending for candidate-focused issue advertising has been a major feature in Michigan's state political campaigns since 2000,

it had never previously been as pervasive as it was in the 2010 cycle. Furthermore, the amount spent for television issue ads is a conservative estimate for all unreported spending because it does not consider undisclosed spending using other media, such as radio, direct mail, web, email, robo-calls, and billboards. It has been suggested that there was considerable unreported spending for direct mail in legislative races in 2010 but since the Postal Service does not have a public file for records of political spending, that contention is unverifiable.

The trend lines in Michigan state campaigns are closely aligned with those in federal campaigns. The role of independent spenders, many of whom are not required to disclose their donors, is growing rapidly. The culture of secrecy favors individuals and interest groups who wish to drive election outcomes and policy processes without leaving fingerprints. Citizens' right to know whose money is driving political processes is being thwarted.

Lawmakers, so far, are siding with interest groups' desire for secrecy over citizens' legitimate right to know what forces are driving their politics.

STATE CONTRIBUTION LIMITS

Individuals are allowed to give \$500 to a candidate for state representative, \$1,000 to a candidate for state senate and \$3,400 to a candidate for statewide office. Political action committees (PACs) and party committees are allowed to give ten-times as much as an individual to a candidate, except that state party committees are allowed to give \$68,000 to statewide candidates. There are no limits on contributions to PACs or party committees. Committees that accept corporate contributions are not allowed to make contributions directly to candidate committees. They are permitted to make independent expenditures only.

GOVERNOR

The 2010 gubernatorial campaign was only the second time since 1982 that a Michigan gubernatorial election did not include an incumbent governor. The 2010 campaign resembled the last such occurrence, in 2002, by having contested primaries in both major parties. It also resembled the campaigns of 2006 and 1998 in having a largely self-funded major party candidate. A significant difference from 2006 and 1998 is that the self-funded candidate, Rick Snyder, won the general election.

Two other major trends from past gubernatorial campaigns continued into 2010. The gubernatorial public financing system was a diminished factor from what it had been prior to 1998, partly due to the fact that the public campaign fund had been raided by the Legislature of \$7 million to balance the State's FY 2008 budget. The resource problem of the public campaign fund was aggravated by the dominance of undisclosed candidate-focused issue advertising. More was spent on unreported television advertisements that were designed to define the candidates' suitability for office than all disclosed spending in the general election, and nearly as much in

the Democratic primary. And while reported spending was vastly greater than that which was undisclosed in the Republican primary, there was still \$1.4 million in unreported television spending, much of it dedicated to attacking Pete Hoekstra. In all, there was more than \$12 million spent for campaign television ads that were not reported in the State's campaign finance reporting system. Reported spending totaled just less than \$27 million

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY

Rick Snyder began his television ad campaign in February, like Dick DeVos in 2006. Unlike Mr. DeVos, whose television campaign continued unabated through November Election Day, Mr. Snyder's television campaign went dark for several prolonged periods. Prior to the primary Snyder's television campaign stopped from late March to early May in outstate markets, then again for most of the month of June. In the Detroit market, Snyder's campaign was dark from March until late June. Nonetheless, Snyder had little competition over the air. Mike Cox and his secret allies, operating through a committee called Americans

for Job Security, were active in outstate markets in May, but they too went dark for most of June. The other most viable candidates, Pete Hoekstra and Mike Bouchard, were not able to muster consistent television presence until July.

In the end, Snyder's resource advantage was an important determinant in the outcome. Including his \$6 million in self-funding, Snyder had \$8 million for the primary period, notably, without accepting contributions from political action committees. Hoekstra, who finished second, had \$1.9 million for the primary, but that total includes \$223,000 in public funds that was not made available until months after the election was over. The Department of State was not able to distribute full allotments of public funds during the primary because the fund had been depleted and because it was holding funds for the general election, in case

both parties' nominees would be eligible for public funds. As a self-funded candidate, Mr. Snyder was not eligible and eventually \$479,000 in additional primary election public funds was distributed to Hoekstra, Bouchard, Cox, Tom George and Democrat Virg Bernero.

Third place finisher Mike Cox had a resource base to be competitive with \$3.4 million in his campaign account, \$390,000 in reported independent expenditures supporting him and almost \$1.2 million in issue advertising supporting him and attacking his opponents. However, Cox's campaign was focused on attacking Hoekstra, not Snyder, and despite endorsements from the Michigan Chamber of Commerce and Right to Life of Michigan, Cox finished 140,000 votes behind Snyder and 40,000 votes behind Hoekstra, out of 1,048,000 votes cast.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY

The Democratic gubernatorial primary was a case where the winner, Virg Bernero, won a television-driven election campaign without buying a television advertisement of his own. His opponent, Andy Dillon, had the financial advantage in his campaign account, \$1.8 million to \$1.3 million (which includes a late distribution of public funds to Bernero in the amount of \$134,000), but Bernero's secret supporters, operating through the Genesee County Democratic Party delivered a lethal \$2 million issue ad campaign that gave

Bernero a 90,000-vote win out of 529,000 votes cast.

Dillon's supporters responded in kind to the Genesee County Democrats with \$875,000 in unreported television issue advertising delivered through two committees called Advance Michigan Now and Northern Michigan Education Fund. However it was not a successful response. Overall, the candidates reported \$3,147,000 raised for the primary. Unreported issue advertising was \$2.9 million.

GENERAL ELECTION

The gubernatorial general election campaign, like the primaries, was dominated by television. The candidates raised \$6.6 million and spent \$3.1 million for television. Their undisclosed supporters, operating through the Michigan Democratic Party and the Republican Governors Association, spent \$7.9 million for candidate-focused issue advertising (\$4.3 million by the MDP, \$3.6 million by the RGA). Mr. Snyder did not buy a broadcast ad of his own until just three weeks before Election Day. Overall, there was \$11 million spent for television and undisclosed spending topped that which was reported, \$7.9 million to \$6.9 million.

Mr. Snyder relied on individual contributors to finance his campaign account for the general election. He stopped self-funding and he continued to refuse contributions from political committees, although the Michigan Republican Party made reported independent expenditures in the amount of \$241,000 on his behalf. Nonetheless, some 44 percent of the financial support behind his general election win is not reported in the State's campaign finance reporting system. That is not an acceptable level of transparency.

SECRETARY OF STATE

Half of the 2010 Secretary of State campaign was reported by the candidates. Half was unreported candidate-focused television issue advertising sponsored by the political parties.

Almost two-thirds of the \$3.7 million spent for the campaign paid for television. The winner, Republican Ruth Johnson, did not buy a television ad of her own. The Michigan Republican Party paid \$1.35 million for television advertising on Johnson's behalf. It did not report the spending or the contributors who provided the money. Johnson reported raising \$741,000, \$354,000 of which was self-funded. Johnson's campaign repaid her \$345,000 of her self-funding by November 10th.

Democrat Jocelyn Benson reported raising \$1,085,000. She paid \$600,000 for television ads and the Democratic Party paid \$465,000 for issue ads on Benson's behalf.

There is an obvious irony in having the elected executive responsible for campaign finance disclosure winning election in a campaign that was mostly undisclosed.

ATTORNEY GENERAL

The 2010 Attorney General campaign was the most expensive in Michigan history. Republican Bill Schuette was the first candidate for the office to raise more than \$2 million in an election cycle on his way to a 286,000-vote victory. The \$3.1 million reported by Schuette, his Democratic opponent David Leyton, and committees making independent expenditures was a record for disclosed spending. The \$2.6 million spent for unreported candidate-focused television issue advertising was also a record. The \$5.7 million of total spending was nearly twice the total of any previous Attorney General campaign.

The campaign was notable for issue advertising by two committees that were previously unknown in Michigan election campaigns. The Michigan Advocacy Trust, “an administrative account of the 23rd Michigan State Senate Republican District Political Party Committee of Ingham County

Michigan, ...a separate account maintained for paying administrative expenses of the sponsoring political party committee and other exempt functions permitted but not reportable under the Michigan Campaign Finance Act,”¹ spent \$1 million for television advertising critical of David Leyton’s handling of his prosecutorial duties in Genesee County. Richard D. McLellan was the contact person of record for Michigan Advocacy Trust.

The Law Enforcement Alliance of America, a 501(c)(4) nonprofit organization based in Falls Church, Virginia, spent \$325,000 for television ads attacking Leyton’s prosecutorial record. LEAA also was a major advertiser in the Michigan Supreme Court campaign.

MICHIGAN SENATE

Republicans had great success in the Michigan Senate in the 2010 elections. They made a net gain of four seats to take a 26-12 super-majority

Michigan Senate campaigns were marginally less expensive in 2010 than they had been in 2006. General election candidates raised a total of \$15,048,588 in 2010, which is down 6.7 percent from the \$16.1 million raised by candidates in 2006. The total of reported resources was \$17,363,501, down 4.6 percent compared to \$18.2 million in 2006.

As is normal, money resources were concentrated in a relatively small number of targeted races. Of the \$17.4 million available to the November candidates, \$8.7 million, or 50 percent, was in just seven races. Reported resources had Republicans with a financial advantage in six of the seven most expensive races, and the Republicans swept all seven of those contests. Patrick Colbeck had less reported financial backing in the 7th District than his Democratic opponent, Kathleen Law, but unreported spending may have given him a financial edge as well. MCFN was unable to verify spending for all candidate-focused issue advocacy in the 7th District.

There were fewer close electoral outcomes in 2010 than 2006. David Hildenbrand's 4,200 vote victory over David LaGrand in the 29th District,

which was also the most expensive race, was the only vote margin of less than five percentage points in 2010. There were six Senate races where the differential was less than five percent in 2006.

Hildenbrand's campaign fundraising total of \$1,105,192 was a record, topping the \$1,023,337 raised by Tom George in 2006. Hildenbrand's total included \$595,000 from his party and the caucus's PAC. Two races in 2006 were more expensive than Hildenbrand's win in the 29th District: Sen. George's victory over Alexander Lipsey in the 20th District and John Pappageorge's win over Andy Levin in the 13th District.

Candidates with greater reported financial backing won 36 of the 38 Senate contests in 2010. Tory Rocca's win over Paul Gielegheim in the 10th District joined him with Patrick Colbeck as the only winners over better-funded opponents. The 8.6 percent vote margin in the 10th District made it the second-closest vote differential, and the only race besides the 29th District where the margin was less than 10 percent.

MICHIGAN HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Republicans picked up a net of 20 seats in the 2010 elections to take a 63-47 majority in the Michigan House of Representatives. Nine incumbents, all Democrats, were swept out of office in a wave election that reversed the tide of the last two House elections.

Candidate fundraising was down in 2010 compared to 2008 and 2006. General election candidates raised \$14,487,618 in 2010, while comparable totals for 2008 and 2006 were \$15,590,979 and \$15,185,430, respectively. When reported PAC and party independent expenditures are considered, total resources were \$17,560,570 in 2010, compared to \$19,294,383 in 2008 and \$17,138,398 in 2006. The average amount raised by winning candidates, \$82,910, was the lowest value for that statistic since 2002.

As is customary, money was concentrated in the seats projected to be the most competitive. However, the top ten races did not represent as great a share of all financial resources as they have in past cycles. The ten most expensive races in 2010 totaled 37.7 percent of all reported financial resources for the House. The top ten races captured 49 percent of all funds in 2006 and 40 percent in 2008. This reflects the broader competitive field that resulted in flipping 20 seats and knocking out nine incumbents in 2010. Beyond the ten most expensive races, there were seven races that topped

\$300,000 and eight more that topped \$180,000. The top 25 races accounted for 61.7 percent of all reported funds available.

Incumbency and financial advantage had weaker correlation with electoral success in 2010 than at any time over the past decade. Incumbents won only 49 of 58 races, 84.5 percent, in 2010. From 2000 through 2008, House incumbents on the November ballot had won 98.3 percent of their elections. Ninety-four winners, 85.5 percent, had greater financial backing in 2010. Over the decade from 2000 through 2008, the better funded candidate had won 93.5 percent of the time.

The closest House election in 2010 was illustrative of the pivotal role party support played in 2010. Republican Kurt Damrow defeated incumbent Democrat Terry Brown by just 18 votes out of 30,362 votes cast in the 84th District. Damrow raised a mere \$7,785, while Brown raised \$75,586. However, Damrow benefited from party independent expenditures in the amount of \$79,837. Brown received no financial support from his party.

A summary of Michigan House candidates' campaign finances are displayed in Appendix F of this report. Top contributors to winning House candidates are listed in Appendix G.

EDUCATION BOARDS

Republicans had a clean sweep of the eight seats on statewide education boards in 2010. Eileen Weiser and Richard Zeile won seats on the State Board of Education. Andrea Newman and Andrew Richner, both incumbents, retained their seats as University of Michigan Regents. Brian Breslin and Mitch Lyons won seats as Michigan State University Trustees. Diane Dunaskiss and Danialle Karmanos won seats as Wayne State University Governors.

This was the third consecutive election cycle where one party swept all eight education seats. Democrats were the winners in 2006 and 2008. These positions are seen by most political observers as a proxy for voters' underlying party preferences, and this was Michigan's third straight 'wave' election, with Republicans reversing the trend of the previous two cycles.

Probably more than any other offices, electoral success for these positions seems to be decoupled from the advantages that normally accrue to incumbency and financial advantage. Richard Zeile, Brian Breslin and Diane Dunaskiss all defeated better-funded opponents. Incumbent MSU Trustee Colleen McNamara was unable to hold her seat. Two winners in 2010, Weiser and Karmanos, reversed their fortunes from their last runs, despite spending only a fraction of what they spent in their last attempts. Eileen Weiser lost as an incumbent in 2006 despite spending \$312,000, more than six-times what she spent in 2010. Danialle Karmanos lost in 2008, despite spending \$241,000, more than ten-times what she spent in 2010.

POLITICAL PARTIES

Summarizing the state political parties' campaign finance activities is difficult because the Michigan Campaign Finance Act does not require the parties to include a summary with their filings, so they don't. The summaries in this section were constructed from analysis of the individual contribution and expenditure records that the parties do file for their state accounts.

The parties take markedly different approaches to building their state accounts. The Democratic State Central Committee is heavily reliant on PACs and candidate committees and less dependent on contributions from individuals. Its top contributors in the 2010 cycle were the Michigan Association for Justice PAC, \$675,000; the House Democratic Fund, \$523,000; the

Michigan Education Association PAC, \$480,650; the Senate Democratic Fund, \$323,000; and Glenn Anderson for State Senate, \$298,150. Only 6.3 percent of the funds in the Democratic Party's state account came from individuals and \$250,000 of that \$333,405 was donated by Jon Stryker.

The Michigan Republican Party is normally more dependent on contributions from individuals than candidate committees and PACs. In the 2010 cycle the pattern was broken by a contribution of \$5,260,000 attributed to the Republican Governors Association Michigan state PAC (RGA MI 2010 PAC). The accounting for funds that went into the RGA MI 2010 PAC was part of a \$114 million national shell game employed by the Republican Governors Association, a 527 committee.¹ The

RGA 527 received \$8.6 million from persons, corporations and PACs based in Michigan, including \$5,372,500 from the Michigan Chamber of Commerce (the business association, not one of its PACs), and sent \$8.4 million to the RGA MI 2010 PAC, 98 percent of which was attributed to donors based outside Michigan.

Individual donors were still an important source of funds for the Michigan Republican Party in the 2010 cycle. They gave the party's state account \$3.7 million, with more than two-thirds of that amount coming from just six persons: Richard DeVos, Sr., \$910,000; Robert Lynas, \$864,000; then-party chairman Ronald Weiser, \$387,604; New Yorker Paul Singer, \$280,000; John

Kennedy III, \$177,000; and Michael Jandernoa, \$172,000.

A major part of both parties' campaign activity was not reported in the State's campaign finance disclosure system. Both parties were very active sponsors of candidate-focused television issue advertising in the fall campaigns. MCFN's examination of the public files of Michigan television broadcasters and cable systems showed the Michigan Democratic Party spending an estimated \$7.7 million in the gubernatorial, attorney general, secretary of state and supreme court campaigns. MCFN's estimate for the Michigan Republican Party's advertising in the attorney general, secretary of state and supreme

court campaigns was \$4.9 million. While the Republican Party did not sponsor gubernatorial issue ads, the Republican Governors Association did buy \$3.6 million of gubernatorial ads. In total, the two parties' unreported television advertising was less than all reported spending by the parties, \$12.6 million to \$14.8 million. If the RGA's

gubernatorial issue ads are included, that which was unreported exceeded total reported spending by the parties, \$16.2 million to \$14.8 million.

POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEES

Michigan's top 150 political action committees (PACs) raised \$48.4 million in the 2010 election cycle. That figure is up by 16.8 percent compared to the \$41.4 million raised by the top 150 state PACs in the 2008 election cycle, but it is down by 6.8 percent compared to the \$51.9 million raised by the top 150 PACs in the 2006 cycle, the last time the Michigan electorate voted for state senators and constitutional executives.

The top fundraising PAC of the cycle was the RGA Michigan PAC, one of numerous state PACs created by the Republican Governors Association across the country in the 2010 cycle. The RGA Michigan PAC reported \$8,429,328 in contributions, a record for a Michigan state PAC. The RGA Michigan PAC gave \$5,260,000 to the Michigan Republican Party, \$3,000,000 to the campaign committee of Texas Gov. Rick Perry, \$130,000 to the Republican Governors Association and it has dissolved.

The Michigan Chamber of Commerce was a top contributor in 2010 to the top PAC's parent organization, the Republican Governors Association. The Michigan Chamber's corporate contributions to the RGA totaled \$5,372,500. Net of the \$3,000,000 contribution to the Texas governor's campaign, the contributions ascribed to individual donors to RGA Michigan PAC were a nearly perfect replacement for the Michigan Chamber's contribution to the RGA. Of the \$8.4 million in individual contributions recorded by RGA Michigan PAC, 98 percent came from persons who do not reside in Michigan. The individual contributions that came to the RGA Michigan PAC first passed through the parent organization.

The legislative caucuses' PACs occupied four of the top nine spots in this cycle's top 150, led

by the House Democratic Fund at \$3,780,415. In aggregate, the caucus PACs' fundraising was down by 24 percent compared to the 2006 cycle: \$9,043,719 compared to \$11,868,330. The caucus PACs ended the 2010 cycle with 33 percent less debt than 2006: \$1,530,000 compared to \$2,264,000.

Another major change in PAC fundraising compared to the recent past was the diminution of the Coalition for Progress. The PAC, which has been funded nearly entirely by Kalamazoo philanthropist Jon Stryker, was down by 73 percent compared to 2006, from \$5,460,077 to \$1,479,950. Coalition for Progress was first organized in the 2006 cycle.

Corporate PACs made their Michigan debut in 2010, exploiting the opening created by the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission*. In Michigan, corporate funds can be used only for independent expenditures, not contributions to candidates, so organizations that are using corporate funds, so far, are segregating their corporate money in new PACs. The most notable corporate PACs were those of the Michigan Association of Realtors and Business Leaders for Michigan. The Realtors' corporate PAC made independent expenditures in the amount of \$450,000 in support of Robert Young, Jr. and Mary Beth Kelly in the Supreme Court campaign. The Business Leaders' corporate PAC spent \$86,000 for radio ads supporting the Michigan Senate campaigns of David Hildenbrand and Tonya Schuitmaker.

Top contributors to the legislative caucus PACs are in Appendix J. Top contributors to the largest leadership PACs are in Appendix K. The top 150 Michigan PACs are displayed in Table 15.

SUPREME COURT

The 2010 Michigan Supreme Court campaign followed trends that have been in evidence since 2000: Committees other than the candidate committees provided the majority of funds in the campaign, and a significant percentage of that spending was not disclosed in the State's campaign finance reporting system. Candidate committees were the source of a record low 23 percent of all spending in the campaign. Undisclosed spending reached a record-high 55 percent of all spending. Reported independent expenditures made up the balance.

Incumbent Justice Robert P. Young, Jr. and Judge Mary Beth Kelly from the 3rd Circuit Court in Wayne County were the Republican Party's nominees. Justice Alton Thomas Davis, who had been appointed to the Court just a month before

the nominating convention, after the resignation of Justice Elizabeth Weaver, and Judge Denise Langford Morris from the Oakland County Circuit Court were the Democratic Party's nominees. Kelly and Young won easily with margins of 500,000 votes and 400,000 votes, respectively, over the third-place finisher, Davis.

Three-fourths of all spending in the campaign paid for television advertisements. Ironically, the top vote-getter in the campaign, Judge Kelly, was the only major party nominee who did not buy a broadcast television ad of her own. The Michigan Republican Party spent \$3.4 million for Supreme Court ads touting Kelly and Young, only \$650,000 of which was disclosed. On the other side, the Michigan Democratic Party spent \$2,450,000 for unreported television ads attacking Kelly and Young.

As with any election where there is undisclosed spending, voters were deprived of important knowledge of who was financially supporting whom. However, the lack of accountability in Supreme Court campaigns is particularly troublesome. The U.S. Supreme Court ruled in *Caperton v Massey Coal Company* that a judge should not participate in a case involving a major campaign supporter, because the financial support may introduce an unacceptable probability of bias. That is, a judge should not rule in a case involving a party who had a substantial financial role in the judge's winning campaign because it deprives the financial supporter's legal opponent of his due process right to an impartial court hearing.

It should be assumed that parties who invest great sums in election campaigns are rational economic actors, and no party has a greater interest in the outcome of a Supreme Court campaign than a party with a high-stakes case in the appeals pipeline. Yet Michigan's conspicuously ineffective campaign

disclosure regime deprives parties to litigation of the knowledge necessary to know when their due process rights may have been compromised, and when they rightfully could request a justice to disqualify himself. The fact that more than \$20 million in the last six Michigan Supreme Court campaigns was unreported represents a toxic cloud shadowing the Court.

One other notable campaign finance development in the 2010 campaign was the \$450,000 independent expenditure by the Michigan Association of Realtors corporate PAC for radio advertisements supporting Kelly and Young. The Realtors corporate PAC reported that \$350,000 of its funds came from its "issues fund." This Russian doll construct allowed the Realtors to report spending but not contributors. They merely named the internal shell entity into which contributions were made.

COURT OF APPEALS

Eight incumbent judges were the only candidates for the eight Michigan Court of Appeals judgeships on the ballot in 2010: Cynthia Stephens and Kurtis Wilder, 1st District; Pat Donofrio, 2nd District; Joel Hoekstra, David Sawyer and Douglas Shapiro, 3rd District; Donald Owens and William Whitbeck, 4th District. Judge Shapiro was running to complete the term to which he had been appointed in 2009, which expires at the end of 2012. The others were running for full six-year terms.

Only three of the candidates' committees raised money in 2010: Judge Stephens: \$3,200; Judge Shapiro: \$19,834; and, Judge Whitbeck: \$112,534. All three stopped raising funds when the filing deadline passed and it was certain that they would not be opposed in the November election.

Top contributors to the Court of Appeals judges who raised money are listed in Appendix M.

CIRCUIT, DISTRICT AND PROBATE COURTS

There were 156 lower court seats up for election in 2010: 71 for Circuit Court, 69 for District Court and 16 for Probate Court. Overall, 58 seats (37.2 percent) were contested and the candidates' committees raised \$6,120,711 in campaigns for the contested seats.

Forty-five of 142 incumbents (31.7 percent) faced a contested race in 2010, a rate that is extraordinarily high by recent standards. Just 16.4 percent of incumbents were challenged in 2008, and contested races for incumbents were even less common in 2006 and 2004: 15.6 percent and 11.9 percent, respectively.

Nineteen incumbents faced one challenger for 19 seats on Wayne County's 3rd Circuit Court, and all 19 successfully held their seats. There were eight contested open Circuit Court seats, six of which were won by the candidate with the financial advantage.

The most expensive Circuit Court race was in Macomb County's 16th Circuit, where Kathy Viviano defeated Michael Servitto. Ms. Viviano raised \$257,989 and Mr. Servitto raised \$137,356 for a total of \$395,345. Ms. Viviano self-funded \$21,277 and Mr. Servitto self-funded \$46,000.

Wayne County's 36th District had 11 eleven incumbents and four challengers running for ten seats. Ten incumbents won and the eleventh, Bill McConico, retained his seat due to the fact that he had been appointed to an unexpired seat. The top fundraiser in the race, former Detroit police chief Ella Bully Cummings, finished in eleventh place, thus all ten successful incumbents defeated a better-funded opponent.

The most expensive District Court race was in Bay County's 74th District. Mark Janer defeated incumbent Jennifer Cass Barnes after a five-way primary. Mr. Janer raised \$88,263, \$67,600 of which was his own money, and Ms Barnes raised \$124,172, \$109,000 of which was contributed by her and her husband. Unsuccessful primary candidates raised \$102,187 to bring the total cost for the seat to \$314,622.

Other challengers who defeated incumbent District Court judges included Jennifer Hesson in Wayne County's 33rd District, Carrie Lynn Fuca in Macomb County's District 41B and Kirsten Hartig in the 4th Division of Oakland County's 52nd District.

Over half of all money spent in the six contested Probate Court races was in the open Oakland County seat, where Kathleen Ryan defeated Dana Margaret Hathaway after a six-person primary. Ms. Ryan raised \$278,834, Ms. Hathaway raised \$303,828 and the four unsuccessful primary candidates raised \$140,112, for a total of \$722,773. Ms. Ryan self-funded \$159,287.

In three of the six contested Probate Court races, the winner defeated an opponent who had greater financial backing.

Campaign summaries for contested Circuit, District and Probate Court elections are displayed in Appendices N, O and P, respectively.

BALLOT PROPOSALS

Michigan voters decided two ballot questions in 2010. Proposal 10-1, the question of whether to hold a constitutional convention, automatically comes to the ballot every 16 years. Proposal 10-2 was a question of whether to ban felons from holding certain public offices.

Those who opposed holding a constitutional convention spent \$412,000 to advocate their position: Citizens Protecting Michigan's

Constitution: \$408,017; Michigan Chamber of Commerce, \$4,072. Proponents of a con-con did not organize a campaign committee. Proposal 10-1 was defeated, 1,960,573 votes to 983,019 votes.

There was no organized fundraising in support of, or opposition to, Proposal 10-2. It was placed on the ballot by the Legislature and it passed by a margin of 2,270,657 to 760,586.

FEDERAL OVERVIEW

Republicans realized great success in federal elections across the nation in 2010. They made a net gain of 63 seats in the U.S. House to take a 242 to 193 majority over Democrats. In the Senate, Republicans picked up six seats but Senate Democrats still hold a 51 to 47 advantage, with two independents caucusing with the Democrats.

Fundraising by congressional candidates increased in the 2010 cycle. Overall receipts were up by 30.2 percent compared to the 2006 midterm elections, with House candidates' receipts up by 26.1 percent compared to the last midterms, and Senate candidates' receipts up by 36.7 percent compared to 2006.

Republican candidates for the U.S. House regained the fundraising advantage they had lost to Democrats in the 2008 cycle, when House Republicans' fundraising had declined. Likewise, Senate Republicans regained the fundraising advantage they had lost to Senate Democrats in 2008.

Independent spending by third-party groups was a very important campaign finance story in 2010. The Democrats' campaign committees' spending was down by more than \$47 million compared to 2008, to \$107.1 million. The Republicans' campaign committees were up by \$3.3 million to \$72.2 million, with the National Republican Campaign Committee's \$15.3 million gain offsetting the National Republican Senatorial Committee's \$12.1 million slide. Overall independent spending by the congressional campaign committees was down by \$49.7 million, or 34.9 percent, compared to 2008, and \$36.1 million, or 16.8 percent, compared to 2006.

Meanwhile, independent spending by nonparty groups was up by \$3 million to \$304.7 million compared to the presidential election year of 2008. Compared to the last midterms in 2006, independent spending by nonparty groups was up by \$246 million for an increase of 342 percent. Notably, independent spending by conservative non-party groups increased almost ten-fold from 2006 to 2010 to \$190 million, while liberal non-party groups' spending almost tripled from \$39 million to \$99 million.

Independent spending was a huge factor in targeted races around the country. It was almost \$37 million in the 2010 Colorado senatorial campaign and just less than \$30 million in the Pennsylvania senatorial campaign. Independent spending topped \$10 million in ten races for the Senate. The most outside spending in a U.S. House race was \$9.1 million spent in Michigan's 7th Congressional District, where Republican Tim Walberg defeated Democrat Mark Schauer. Schauer had ridden the Democratic wave in 2008 to defeat then incumbent Walberg.

Independent spending by outside groups totaled a mere \$54.6 million in the 2000 federal elections, according to the Center for Responsive politics, and \$30.9 million in the 2002 midterms, less than what was spent in one senatorial campaign in 2010. Independent, and increasingly anonymous, spending subsequent to the 2010 *Citizens United* decision by the U.S. Supreme Court has changed federal elections profoundly, in a way that is hard to square with any conventional notion of democracy.

FEDERAL CONTRIBUTION LIMITS

Individuals were allowed to give federal candidates up to \$2,400 per election in the 2010 cycle; that is, \$2,400 for the primary and \$2,400 for the general election. An individual also was permitted to give federal party committees up to \$30,400 for the election cycle, and \$5,000 per year to any political action committee that was allowed to make contributions to candidates. Individuals were subject to a total contribution limit of \$115,000 to all candidate committees, party committees and political action committees that were allowed to make contributions to candidates.

Subsequent to the *Citizens United* ruling, a new class of “Super PACs” came into existence, to which contributions are not limited. Super PACs are allowed to make unlimited independent expenditures but they are not allowed to make contributions to candidates.

U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES - MICHIGAN

Michigan's 2010 Congressional campaigns involved much more money than ever before. The general election candidates raised \$32.8 million and PACs, party committees and outside interest groups spent more than \$18 million for independent expenditures and electioneering communications in just three races. The 2010 campaign total of more than \$50 million was 50 percent more than Michigan's 2008 total, and the \$14.1 million spent in the 7th District, where former Rep. Tim Walberg defeated incumbent Rep. Mark Schauer, was just three percent less than the \$14.5 million total raised by all Michigan's Congressional candidates in 2004. Walberg overcame Schauer's two-to-one fundraising advantage and a narrow spending advantage by Schauer's outside supporters to win. **The \$9.1 million spent by non-candidate committees in Michigan's 7th District was the most spent by outside groups in any U.S. House race in the country.**

Michigan's second most expensive race was the 9th District, where freshman Rep. Gary Peters defeated Rocky Raczkowski. In the 9th District the candidates' spending was greater than that of outside groups, \$5.2 million to \$4.1 million. Peters' \$1.4 million advantage in fundraising over Raczkowski was more than offset by the \$2.2 million spending advantage provided by Raczkowski's outside supporters.

Michigan's third costliest race was the 1st District, where Dan Benishek defeated Gary McDowell for an open seat. Benishek raised more than McDowell, \$1.3 million to \$837,000, and Benishek's outside supporters spent more than twice as much as McDowell's supporters, \$3.3 million to \$1.5 million. Outside groups accounted for nearly 70 percent of all spending in the 1st District.

Michigan's other notable Congressional fundraising stories from 2010 involved outgoing and incoming committee chairs. Rep. Sander Levin tripled his fundraising total from 2008 to 2010 as chairman of Ways and Means. He took in \$726,000 in 2008 and \$2.3 million in 2010. Rep. Dave Camp, the new chairman of Ways and Means, bumped his fundraising by 35 percent to just over \$3 million, more than 77 percent of which was donated by PACs. Rep. Fred Upton, the new chairman of Energy and Commerce, increased his fundraising by 43 percent to just more than \$2 million. None of the three faced a competitive election, with each winning by more than 25 percent of the vote.

TOWARD A SYSTEM OF CAMPAIGN ACCOUNTABILITY

Campaign finance laws and regulations exist to limit possibilities of corruption and to satisfy the public's need to know whose money is being used to affect the outcome of elections and drive public policy initiatives. Michigan's system of campaign finance disclosure is failing on both counts.

REPORTING IS INCOMPLETE

The Michigan Campaign Finance Network collected data from the public files of Michigan's television broadcasters and cable systems to document some \$23 million of campaign advertising in statewide races in the 2010 election cycle that was not reported in the State's campaign finance disclosure system. This is a conservative estimate of unreported campaign spending because it does not consider other media by which campaign communications are distributed: radio, web, email, robo-calls, billboards, display advertisements and direct mail.

This spending is not disclosed because the Michigan Department of State's interpretation of the Michigan Campaign Finance Act says that only express advocacy is a campaign expenditure. This means that disclosure of campaign spending is strictly optional unless the communication contains words similar to the 'magic words' of *Buckley v. Valeo*, such as "vote for," "vote against,"

"elect," defeat" or "reject."¹ Merely defining a candidate's suitability for office in the most strident terms does not make a campaign expenditure, in the view of the Department of State.

This interpretation has allowed some \$70 million of campaign television advertising to pass undisclosed in Michigan state election campaigns since 2000. In 2010, most of the money spent in the campaigns for secretary of state, attorney general and justice of the Supreme Court was off the books. More than \$12 million of gubernatorial campaign advertising was unreported. If there is unethical or illegal consideration given to a campaign contributor, it probably cannot be detected because the biggest campaign spenders aren't identifiable.

Policy recommendation: The Michigan Campaign Finance Act should be amended to add a definition for **electioneering communications** that would include any communication using the name or image of a candidate for public office within 90 days of an election, and require full disclosure of the financing behind those communications. Corporate aggregators of funds that are used to purchase electioneering communications, or express advocacy, should be required to make regular reports to the Department of State, naming their donors and the amount that

those donors gave. Likewise, the political parties should be required to name all their contributors and the amounts that they have given, whether their money is used to pay for express advocacy or electioneering communications.

The U.S. Supreme Court decision in *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission* made an unambiguous statement that full disclosure of campaign spending, and spenders' donors, is constitutionally permissible, whether it applies to express advocacy or electioneering communications.² This reform is urgently needed in Michigan campaigns.

REPORTING IS TOO INFREQUENT

In years when candidates are running for State office, they go nearly seven months prior to reporting their campaign finance activity before and after the primary and general elections. In years when officeholders are not standing for election, they file only one report, a month after the end of that year.

This reporting schedule deprives citizens of an adequate opportunity to monitor who is giving elected officials campaign contributions as those officials are conducting the duties of their office. If there are correlations between votes and

campaign contributions, they may be invisible to citizens until months after the votes are taken.

Disclosure by political action committees is too infrequent as well. PACs file only three reports each calendar year, and there is a six-month gap between reports once every year. This schedule denies citizens their right to oversight of interest groups' financial role in pushing policy agendas.

Policy recommendation: All political committees – candidate committees, ballot committees, political action committees and party committees – should be required to file a complete campaign finance report at least quarterly every year. Federal political committees are required to meet or exceed that frequency of reporting.
